TORVER is a small township and a parish, formed in 1866 from the civil parish of Ulverston, with a station on the London, Midland and Scottish railway, 12 miles by road and 21 by rail north from that town, 7 north-east from Broughton, 7 south-west from Hawkshead and 12 from Ambleside, in the Lonsdale division of the county, petty sessional division of Hawkshead, hundred of Lonsdale (north of the Sands), union of Ulverston, county court district of Ambleside, rural deanery of Ulverston, archdeaconry of Furness and diocese of Carlisle. The river Torver runs through the village, and is here crossed by a stone bridge of one arch. The parish borders on the Coniston Water, which is 1 mile distant from the church, and the whole district abounds in beautiful scenery. This is the best station to alight at for the ascent of the "Old Man of Conistone." The church of St. Luke, a building of native slate-stone, with red sandstone facings in the Early English style, was rebuilt in 1884 at a cost of £1,400, and consists of chancel, nave, south porch and low central tower containing one bell, cast in 1730: the font is supposed to be of pre-Reformation date: there are about 150 sittings. The register of baptisms and burials dates regularly from the year 1661 and of marriages from 1791; there are older registers, but they are imperfect. A faculty for the consecration of the church and interment of the dead, bearing the signature of Archbishop Cranmer, and dated at Lambeth, July 23rd, 1588, is kept with other parish papers in an ancient chest. The living was

declared a rectory November 20, 1866, net yearly value £205, with glebe and residence, in the gift of the Peache trustees, and held since 1916 by the Rev. John Benjamin Panes. There is a Baptist chapel at SUNNYBANK. The manor, which is united with Muchland, belongs to the Crown. The principal landowners are the trustees of the Barratt estate and the resident yeomen. The soil is gravel; subsoil, stone and slate. The land is principally pasture. The area is 3,815 acres of land, a great portion consisting of rocks and waste, and 279 of water; rateable value, £1,384; the population of the civil parish in 1921 was 205 and of the ecclesiastical parish in 1911, 203.

TOTTINGTON parish, formerly extending from 4 to 6 miles from Bury, has, under the provisions of the Local Government Act, 1894, been reconstituted, the parts of the municipal borough of Bury and Urban district of Ramsbottom being added to those civil parishes. Tottington has two

stations on the Bury and Tottington branch of the London, Midland and Scottish railway, and is in the parliamentary borough of Bury, hundred of Salford, union, county court district, petty sessional division and rural deanery of Bury, archdeaconry of Rochdale and diocese of Manchester. This

parish is governed by an Urban District Council of fifteen members, formed Feb. 14, 1899, under the provisions of the previously mentioned Act. St. Anne's is a district chapelry formed out of Bury in 1844; the church, consecrated in 1799 and repaired in 1884, is a small and plain edifice of stone with one bell: the interior was repewed in 1868 and a new organ erected: there are 500 sittings, of which 423 are free. The register of baptisms dates from 1799 and of marriages from 1862. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £340, with residence, in the gift of the rector of Bury, and held since 1906 by the Rev. Henry Reeder, of St. Bees. St. John's Free Church of England is a plain stone building, erected in 1867, and has a tower with spire containing one bell: there are sittings for 400 persons, of which 200 are free; Rev. George H. Spencer, minister. Green Mount Congregational chapel, erected in 1867 at a cost of about £4,000, is a stone building in the Gothic style, and has sittings for 600 persons. The Wesleyan Methodist chapel was erected in 1905 at a cost of £6,000, and has 500 sittings. The Roman Catholic Home, Holly Mount (a certified Poor Law school for girls), is in connection with the Roman Catholic Protection and Rescue Society; it was opened Sept. 21, 1888. Considerable additions have been made to the original building and it is now available for 260 children. The Home is in the charge of the Sisters of Charity of Jesus and Mary. There are extensive works for cotton spinning and manufacturing calico and delaine bleaching and printing and a factory for soap for the use of printers and manufacturers. In the 17th century the manor of Tottington was divided for local purposes into two townships, as at present constituted. The royal manor of Tottington was in the successive possession of the houses of Laci (Earls of Lincoln) and Plantagenet (Dukes of Lancaster), and was the seat of the superior court, to which the manors of Bury, Middleton, Chatterton and Alkrington owed suit and service: this manor was given to General Monk, Duke of Albemarle, by Charles II. as a partial reward for the services rendered by him to the house of Stuart: the Albemarle possessions vested in Elizabeth, Duchess of Buccleuch (d. Nov. 21, 1827), from whom the manor of Tottington lineally descended to Lord Henry James Scott Montagu, 2nd baron Montagu of Boughton, who died 30th Oct. 1845, when that title became extinct, but was revived in 1885 in favour of Lord Henry John Douglas Scott Montagu, created Baron Montagu, of Beaulieu, Hants. The principal landowners are the Duke of Buccleuch and Queensberry K.T. who is lord of the manor of Tottington, C. Royds esq. and the trustees of the late T. S. Potter. The soil is generally heavy; subsoil, stone. The chief crops are hay. The area of the civil parish and Urban District is 2,617 acres of land and 26 of water; rateable value, £25,174; the population in 1921 was 6,760.

The population of the ecclesiastical district of St. Anne in 1911 was 5,816.

The population of the wards in 1921 was:—Chapel, 1,356; Church, 988; Greenmount, 1,523; Hawkshaw, 597; Walshaw, 2,296.

WALSHAW or Walshaw Lane, about a mile west, forms a ward in Tottington Urban District; it was formed into an ecclesiastical parish in 1889. Christ Church, also called the "Jesse Haworth Memorial Church," completed in 1891, is a cruciform structure of native stone in the Decorated Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave, transepts, south porch and a tower on the south-east with spire and one bell: there are memorial windows to Dennis and Mary Haworth, one erected by the Rev. J. G. Haworth to James and Nancy Haworth and two others to members of the Haworth family, besides one to John Whitehead: the church was built and endowed by Miss Haworth and the Rev. John Gorell Haworth, at a joint cost of £25,000, as a memorial to Jesse Haworth esq. of Walshaw, and has 516 sittings. The register dates from the year 1892. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £380, in the gift of Mrs. Hibbert, and held since 1916 by the Rev. John Day Talbot B.A.R.U.I. In the parish are two factories, a bleaching, dyeing and printing works, a few gentlemen's residences and many cottages. There is also a Wesleyan Methodist chapel and a Mission room. The population of the ecclesiastical district in 1911 was 1,837.

TRAWDEN is a village and township, part of which was formed into an ecclesiastical parish Aug. 5, 1845, from the civil parish of Whalley; it is 2 miles south-east from Colne station on the Accrington and Skipton section of the London, Midland and Scottish railway, 6 from Burnley and 12 from Skipton, in the parliamentary borough of Nelson and Colne, Colne petty sessional division, higher division of Blackburn hundred, Burnley union, Colne county court district, rural deanery of Burnley, archdeaconry of Blackburn and diocese of Manchester. The township adopted the Local Government Act, 1858, March 10, 1863, but under the provisions of the Act of 1894 it is now governed by an Urban District Council. The church of St. Mary, erected in 1845, is a building of stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave and an embattled western tower containing one bell: there are brasses to Mrs. Catherine Humfrey, of Carry Bridge, near Colne, d. 1855; the Rev. Thomas Craven Humfrey, 30 years vicar of the parish, d. 1875, and his wife Mary, d. 1872; the stained east window is a memorial to Mrs. Mary Humfrey: the reredos of Caen stone was given in 1876 by Canon A. T. Parker M.A. rector of Burnley: the church was reseated and improved in 1882 at a cost of £600, and the whole of the windows were re-glazed in 1885, at a cost of £100: there are sittings for 500 persons. The register dates from the year 1840. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £187, with residence, in the gift of the Crown and the Bishop of Manchester alternately, and held since 1915 by the Rev. Hugh Paul Dempsey M.A. of Magdalen College, Oxford. There are Wesleyan Methodist, Free Gospel and Primitive Methodist chapels. Facing the Wesleyan chapel is a stone memorial to the men connected with the district who fell in the Great War, 1914-18. There is a cemetery, formerly belonging to the Society of Friends, and dating from 1688, but opened about 1858 for the use of Dissenters generally: it is now the property of the Primitive Methodist Trust. The Duke of Buccleuch K.T. is lord of the manor. Alfred, William and Richard Sagar esqrs. and John Hopkinson esq. are the chief landowners. The soil is clay; the subsoil, clay and rock, and the land is principally in pasture. The area of the civil parish and Urban District is 6,786 acres of land and 30 of water; rateable value, £12,238; the population in 1921 was 2,762; of the ecclesiastical parish in 1911, 2,202.
