DARCY LEVER.

A township in the parish of Bolton, is a part of Lever Bridge new parish, which comprises the township of Darcy Lever, and part of the township of Haulgh, and is separated from the mother parish of Bolton for ecclesiastical purposes. It is about a mile and a half east by south from Bolton, situate on the river Croal. The Church of St. Stephen was erected in 1844, at a cost of about £3000, on land given by the Earl of Bradford, who also contributed £500 towards its erection. It is a cruciform structure of terra cotta in the decorated English style of architecture. It has nave, chancel, and transepts, with a tower surmounted by a graceful spire. The interior is remarkably neat, and embellished with five windows of

stained glass. The living is of the annual value of £180 with residence, in the patronage of the Crown and the Bishop of Manchester alternately. The Rev. Engelbert Horley is the present vicar. The Wesleyans have a chapel here. There is a National School and one for infants. Over the valley is a magnificent viaduct, on the Liverpool, Bolton and Bury Railway, and an aqueduct of three arches for the Manchester, Bolton, and Bury Canal. There are several collieries and cotton mills in the township. The Earl of Bradford and Wm. Gray, Esq., M.P., are principal landowners. Acreage of the township, 540; the rateable value in March of the present year 1870 was £6,421. Population in 1861, 2,071.

DEANE.

DEANE is an extensive parish a mile and three quarters south-west from Bolton, situated near the road from Manchester to Lancaster, and on the Bolton and Leigh line of railway. The villiage and parish church of Deane are situated in the township of Rumworth, which contains 1300 statute acres; the rateable value in March, 1866, was £8,344; March, 1868, £9,149; and in the same month of the present year, 1870, £10,118; and had a population in 1861 of 1861. The church of St. Mary is a venerable rusticated edifice, consisting of an embattled body, with a low projecting wing in front, extending beneath the north windows and terminating the porch; the tower is surmounted by four pinnacles and vane, plain columns, bearing pointed arches, separate the nave from the side

aisles; the roof is ornamented by square woodwork, clustered at the angles. The living is of the annual value of £213, in the patronage of the Lord Chancellor, and held by the Rev. William Bashall, M.A. Here is a National school, partially endowed with £35, arising from land in Tottington, and further endowed by £40 per annum, secured in the funds by the late Joseph Ridgway, Esq., of Ridgmont, Henry Tempest and William Ford Hulton, Esquires, are the chief landowners. There are charities of about £40 yearly value. The townships of Farnworth and Kersley, formerly in this parish, are now separated, and form a distinct parish.

EDGEWORTH.

EDGEWORTH is a township in the parish of Bolton, containing an area of 2,480 statute acres, and a population in 1861 of 1,350; the rateable value in March, 1866, was £4,294; March, 1868, £4,354; and March, 1870, £4,774. It is about four miles north from Bolton, and near to Entwistle Railway Station. It was formerly a common belonging to the Blackburns and Entwistles, the latter of whom were anciently seated in Entwistle, an ad-

joining township. There is a school at Broadhead in connection with St. Ann's Church, Turton, which is licensed for divine service. The Independents and Wesleyans have each a chapel here. There are cotton mills and stone quarries in the township.

FARNWORTH

Is the largest and most populous township in the Bolton Union. It stands on the high road between Bolton and Manchester, being about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the former place, and 8 from the latter. It is in the Salford hundred, and in the southern division of the county. Farnworth and Kearsley, a small township adjoining, form one parish for ecclesiastical purposes, in the diocese of Manchester. The river Irwell flows through a portion of the township on the east side. According to the census of 1861, the population was 8,720, and that of Kersley, 5,003. In 1870, the population of Farnworth would be considerably over 12,000, and Kersley about 7,000. Very little is known of the history of Farnworth prior to the present century. It is supposed to have originally derived its name from the growth of ferns in the district. Wm. Ford Hulton, Esq., J.P., of Hulton park, is Lord of the Manor, and the fern leaf forms part of the Hulton coat of arms, and the first mention of the township is in the history of the Hulton family, who settled here in 1311. The name again occurs in Adam's Index Villains, a rare work published in 1680. The place at this time was a wild uncultivated waste. Very little of the land was enclosed, and the people were extremely poor. In a work published by a man named Ramsbotham, who lived in Birch House as a tenant of Sir Robert Walmsley, of Bootles, but now occupied by Major Whittam, J.P., the boundaries of the township are given, and some statistics with reference to other interesting matters. The most interesting details, however, commence with the present century. According to these records, Holland Sunday school was the first place of worship in the district. It was founded by the late Mr. Roger Holland, of Birch Hall, and intended as a Sunday school for children

of all denominations. It is now worked by the Wesleyans exclusively. The old Independent Chapel, of which the Rev. Joseph Dyson was pastor for more than 50 years, was built in 1809; and the new Congregational Church in 1850; the Wesleyan Chapel in Market street in 1830, enlarged in 1844; and the new chapel in Church-st. was opened in 1861. The Parish Church was opened in 1826; the Primitive Methodists in 1860; Albert road Congregational in 1863: Independent (now Wesleyan) school at New Bury in 1830; and St. Gregory's Catholic Chapel in 1853. The living of Farnworth and Kersley is worth from £300 to £400 a year. It is in the gift of the Hulme trustees, and the presentations are confined to the graduates of Brasenose College, Oxford. The Rev. William Henry Taylor, M.A., is the present vicar. In 1864, St. James's New Church was opened at New Bury, a hamlet in Farnworth, of which the Rev. C. J. Stewart is the present vicar. District school-churches have also been opened in Egerton-street, and Kersley moor, in order to relieve the Parish church. The land in the district belongs chiefly to the Bridgewater trustees, the Earl of Bradford, Miss Rawson, and the trustees of the late Mr. Heywood. For many years after the introduction of the present century there was not a building of any kind on the Heywood estate. Leigh house was the first. The population was then very small, and the trade of the district confined solely to hand-loom weaving, mining operations, and farming. The inhabitants lived on the plainest food and dressed after the same manner. The first manufacturing was done by hand, the late Mr. James Rothwell Barnes, father of the present Thomas Barnes, Esq., late M.P. for Bolton, being the first to commence. He was

followed by the late Mr. William Barton, and Mr. John Davenport, each of them employing a few hand loom weavers. There were also a few of that class called "Putters out," men who gave out warps and bundles of weft to be woven in the district. With this exception there was no commerce of any kind. Next to the late Mr. Barnes, the firm of Messrs. Joseph and Robert Lord contributed most to the establishment of a local cotton trade. They commenced the manufacture of cotton goods at an early period of the present century, and continued to do a first-class trade until their retirement from the business a few years ago. There are several very extensive coal mines in the district, which are being very profitably worked by the Bridgewater trustees and other eminent firms. The construction of the Manchester and Bolton Railway, which runs right through, has wonderfully developed the resources of the township. It was opened in 1838, and has been the means of increasing the trade and multiplying the population. There are upon the line three stations within easy distance of the town. At the present time there are about 30 cotton mills in Farnworth and its immediate vicinity; also foundries, spindle shops, and other manufactories. There are also large gas works, established in 1854, by which the whole of the town and district is supplied with gas. The Farnworth paper mill belonging to the executors of the late John and Thomas Bonsor Crompton, rank as one of the largest works of the kind in the king-

dom. There is in Kersley a large tissue paper manufactory belonging to Messrs. James and John Fletcher. In 1821, the population was 2,044, with 344 houses, and the assessment £2,769. In 1870, the population is over 12,000, with 2,500 houses, and £35,900 of an assessment. The township contains 1,450 acres. The workhouse, belonging to the Bolton Union, stands in the township. It cost over £40,000, and contains from 500 to 600 inmates. A Local Board was established in 1863, since when the streets have been sewered, paved, and lighted with gas, and other works of improvement carried out. A Park, presented to the town by Thomas Barnes, Esq., was publicly opened on the 12th October, 1864, by the Rt. Hon. W. E. Gladstone, who was then Chancellor of the Exchequer. It contains about 12 acres of land in the very centre of the town, and is much used by the inhabitants for recreation purposes, by whom it is highly appreciated. The land was estimated to be worth, according to the value of the building land adjoining from £5,000 to £6,000. The Local Board have this year agreed to purchase from the executors of the late Mr. John Hardman, a valuable plot of land near the Bowling Green Inn for Market purposes. The cost is £3,000, and the income arising from the letting of stalls, etc., at present amounts to near £150 per annum. The *Farnworth Observer*, the only paper published in the town, was established May 5th, 1860.
