Support hub for victims and survivors of terrorism

The government has launched a tender to establish a new, trauma-informed Support Hub for victims and survivors of terrorism.

Running 24/7, the hub will offer long-term care to those affected – whether the incident took place in the UK or abroad – and reflects lessons learned from survivors and international best practice.

Funded by Pool Re, the UK's leading terrorism reinsurer, the hub is part of the government's Plan for Change and its wider CONTEST counter-terrorism strategy.

The initiative aims to prioritise both emotional recovery and community resilience alongside existing economic measures.

What is terrorism?

Terrorism is defined in **Section 1 Terrorism Act 2000** as the use or threat of action designed to:

- influence the government or an international governmental organisation; or
- intimidate the public, or a section of the public.
- made for the purposes of advancing a political, religious, racial or ideological cause; and it involves or causes:
- serious violence against a person.
- · serious damage to a property.
- · a threat to a person's life.

- a serious risk to the health and safety of the public; or
- serious interference with or disruption to an electronic system.

Threat level

The threat to the UK from terrorism is currently **substantial**.

This indicates that an attack is likely. It is the middle of the 5 levels of threat which terrorism is assessed against, with the level set by the Joint Terrorism Analysis Centre and the Security Service.

New Prevent Toolkit for Local Authorities

A refreshed Prevent Duty Toolkit is now available to help Local Authorities meet their duty under the Counterterrorism and Security Act (2015).

<u>A new toolkit</u> shares examples of good practice, highlights benchmarks, and supports a more consistent approach to Prevent delivery. It complements—but doesn't replace—statutory guidance.

Notice. Check. Share.

A new section also outlines the 'Notice, Check, Share' process to help professionals respond to radicalisation concerns:

- Notice something concerning in behaviour or views.
- Check with your safeguarding lead to gather context.
- Share make a referral using the National Prevent Referral Form.

Safeguarding is everyone's business, and it is important to respond to any concerns through a Prevent referral, including with regards to any fascination with violence, even in the absence of a specific extremist ideology.

Guidance: get help for radicalisation

Since the start of 2017, agencies and law enforcement have disrupted 39 late-stage plots and there have been 15 domestic terror attacks.

These terrorist attacks have sadly demonstrated that the public may be targeted at a broad range of public venues and spaces.

What Is CONTEST – and Why Does It Matter?

The UK Government's CONTEST strategy is designed to prevent terrorism before it starts—as well as respond swiftly and effectively when threats arise.

At the heart of this strategy is the Counter-Terrorism Operations Centre (CTOC), which brings together law enforcement, education, social care, and international partners to stop terrorism and protect communities.

The Four Pillars of CONTEST:

- Prevent stop people from becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism.
- Pursue stop attacks before they happen, in the UK and abroad.
- Protect strengthen security at home and in public spaces.
- **Prepare** reduce the impact of attacks and prevent repeat incidents.

Beyond these pillars, the government also:

- Works with tech companies to tackle online radicalisation
- · Strengthens border security
- Supports public and private sectors to report concerns and stay safe

NEW: Home Office Level 3 Prevent Training (Replaces WRAP)

The Home Office's new face to face Level 3 Prevent Training replaces the old WRAP course and is aimed at frontline professionals and community groups who have direct contact with young people and members of the public in a caseload or direct setting. Includes sectors like education, alternative education, holiday clubs, health, social care, housing, and justice.

This free, advanced session helps you understand how to spot the signs of radicalisation and respond safely through a multi-agency approach.
