#### **Spotting the Signs Before Summer**

As schools wind down, it's crucial to remain alert to changes in behaviour, particularly in students showing signs of isolation, withdrawal, or heightened emotional distress.

Keep an eye out for:

- Increased interest in divisive ideologies or conspiracy theories
- · A sudden rejection of friends, family, or authority figures.
- · Secretive behaviour, especially online.
- Use of extremist language or symbols.

#### Online Safety for Parents & Carers

Unsupervised online time can expose young people to radicalising content, hate speech, and online grooming. Encourage parents to:

- Set clear digital boundaries.
- Use parental controls and filters.
- Engage in open, judgment-free conversations about what their children see online.

### **National Picture**

#### Threat level

The threat to the UK from terrorism is currently **substantial**.

This indicates that an attack is likely. It is the middle of the 5 levels of threat which terrorism is assessed against, with the level set by the Joint Terrorism Analysis Centre and the Security Service.

#### New Prevent Duty Toolkit for Local Authorities:

A refreshed Prevent Duty Toolkit is now available to help Local Authorities meet their duty under the Counterterrorism and Security Act (2015).

This toolkit shares examples of good practice, highlights benchmarks, and supports a more consistent approach to Prevent delivery. It complements - but doesn't replace - statutory guidance. A new section has been added to the Prevent guidance on using the National Referral Form and the 'Notice, Check, Share' process. Professionals may wish to adopt this process if they have concerns about radicalisation.

#### Notice. Check. Share.

A new section also outlines the 'Notice, Check, Share' process to help professionals respond to radicalisation concerns:

- **Implications for Bury:**Notice something concerning in behaviour or views.
- Check with your safeguarding lead to gather context.
- Share make a referral using the National Prevent Referral Form.

### Guidance: get help for radicalisation

Since the start of 2017, agencies and law enforcement have disrupted 39 late-stage plots and there have been 15 domestic terror attacks.

These terrorist attacks have sadly demonstrated that the public may be targeted at a broad range of public venues and spaces.

### What Is CONTEST – and Why Does It Matter?

The UK Government's CONTEST strategy is designed to prevent terrorism before it starts—as well as respond swiftly and effectively when threats arise.

At the heart of this strategy is the Counter-Terrorism Operations Centre (CTOC), which brings together law enforcement, education, social care, and international partners to stop terrorism and protect communities.

- ♦ The Four Pillars of CONTEST:
  - Prevent stop people from becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism.
- Pursue stop attacks before they happen, in the UK and abroad.
- Protect strengthen security at home and in public spaces.
- Prepare reduce the impact of attacks and prevent repeat incidents.

Beyond these pillars, the government also:

- Works with tech companies to tackle online radicalisation
- Strengthens border security
- Supports public and private sectors to report concerns and stay safe

#### What is Terrorism?

Terrorism is defined in Section 1 Terrorism Act 2000

(http://www.legislation.gov.uk/ukpga/2000/11/section/1) as the use or threat of action designed to:

- influence the government or an international governmental organisation or
- intimidate the public, or a section of the public.

made for the purposes of advancing a political, religious, racial or ideological cause; and it involves or causes:

- serious violence against a person.
- · serious damage to a property.
- a threat to a person's life.
- a serious risk to the health and safety of the public or
- serious interference with or disruption to an electronic system.

#### **NEW:** Home Office Level 3 Prevent Training (Replaces WRAP)

The Home Office's new face to face Level 3 Prevent Training replaces the old WRAP course and is aimed at frontline professionals and community groups who have direct contact with young people and members of the public in a caseload or direct setting. Includes sectors like education, alternative education, holiday clubs, health, social care, housing, and justice.

This free, advanced session helps staff understand how to spot the signs of radicalisation and respond safely through a multi-agency approach.
