NOTABLE BURY MEN.

Among famous men born in Bury may be named John Kay, the inventor of the fly-shuttle (born 1704, date of death unknown); Dr. James Wood (Holcombe. 1761-1839), Master of St. John's College, Cambridge, and Dean of Ely; Sir Robert Peel (1788-1850), Prime Minister; Sir Edward Ebenezer Kay (1822-1897), Lord Justice of Appeal; Sir John Holker (1828-1882), Attorney-General and Lord Justice of Appeal; and Lord Hewart of Bury, the present Lord Chief Justice.

Bury's Honorary Freemen are Lord Hewart of Bury, admitted 1st August, 1922; and the Earl of Derby, K.G., 9th September, 1926.

THE BURY INFIRMARY.

The Bury Infirmary is beautifully situated on the outskirts of the town, on Walmersley Road. The infirmary was opened on 25th March, 1882. The Rector of Bury (the Rev. H. L. Hornby) is the president and Mr. Alexander W. Maitland, of Silver Street Chambers, the hon. secretary. The usefulness of the institution has been enormously increased in recent years through the war memorial scheme, and through the munificence of the trustees of the late Colonel Barlow, who have given new buildings and equipment, together with an endowment of the gift. A sum of £30,000 was raised in a centenary commemoration.

RATES OF POSTAGE.

LETTERS.—The prepaid rate of postage is as follows: Not exceeding 2 oz. in weight, 1½d. ; for every additional 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz., ½d.

A letter if posted unpaid is charged on delivery with double postage ; if posted underpaid, with double the amount short paid. No letter may exceed two feet in length, one foot in width, or one foot in depth, or, if made up in the form of a roll, thirty inches in length and four inches in diameter. There is no limit of weight.

IMPERIAL AND FOREIGN.—Letters: To British possessions generally, to H.M. Ships of War and H.M. Troops serving abroad, Egypt, United States of America, and Tangier, 1½d. first oz., and 1d. each oz. after ; to all other places, 2½d. for the first oz., and 1½d. for each additional oz. Postcards, 1½d. Printed Papers, Commercial Papers, and Samples per 2 oz. ½d. Minimum for Commercial Papers, 2½d. and for Samples, 1d.

INLAND REGISTRATION.—Compensation for loss or damage is given in respect of Inland Registered Packets of all kinds, according to the following table—the fees set forth in which include the ordinary registration fee of 3d. :

NEWSPAPER RATE.—For every copy of a registered newspaper not exceeding 6 oz. in weight, 1d. ; for every additional 6 oz. or fraction of 6 oz., ½d. If two or more newspapers are sent in a single packet each copy will be liable to the same postage as if it had been posted separately, unless such postage exceeds that chargeable on a printed paper of the same weight. No copy or packet of copies may weigh more than 2-lbs, or exceed 2-ft. in length, or 1-ft. in width or depth, or if made up in the form of a roll thirty inches in length and four inches in diameter.

PRINTED PAPER RATE.—Articles admissable under the existing regulations may be sent as printed papers up to a limit of 2-lb. at the following rates : For every 2 oz. or fraction thereof, ½d.

Printed packets prepaid ½d. only and intended for despatch on the day of posting must be posted not later than 5-0 p.m. The minimum rate of postage for all packets sent at the Printed Paper Rate, and intended for despatch by the night mail is 1d., if posted after the specified time.
